Spiritual

Explore beliefs and experience; respect faiths, feeling and values; enjoy learning about oneself, others and the surrounding world; use imagination and creativity; reflect.

At St. Luke's we foster spirituality by:

The study of Geography is promoting a sense of wonder and fascination with the physical and human world.

An understanding of scale is an important aspect of Geography and how small changes in climate can have far reaching consequences.

Understanding that all life is linked together and create the processes that make Earth the only known inhabited planet.

Pupils reflect on the long and short term impacts noting the rights and wrongs linking into the value of justice. The value of stewardship is covered looking at reduce, reuse and recycle.

Moral

Recognise right and wrong; respect the law; understand consequences; investigate moral and ethical issues; offer reasoned views.

Pupils' moral development is shown by their:

- Ability to recognise the difference between right and wrong and to readily apply this
 understanding in their own lives, recognise legal boundaries and, in so doing, respect the
 civil and criminal law of England
- Understand of the consequences of their behaviour and actions
- Interest in investigating and offering reasoned views about moral and ethical issues and ability to understand and appreciate the viewpoints of others on these issues

At St. Luke's we foster morality by:

Moral issues are a vital part of many of the topics covered in Geography.

We look at how the development of cites have put pressure on wildlife and the rural-urban fringe. We explore issues of poverty and the issue of food miles and the moral dilemma of importing food and the consequences of it on global warming.

Social

Use a range of social skills; participate in the local community; appreciate diverse viewpoints; participate, volunteer and cooperate; resolve conflict; engage with the 'British Values' of democracy, the rule of law, liberty, respect and tolerance.
